Prof Low is the Associate Dean and the Associate Professor of Finance at the Nanyang Business School, Nanyang Technological University (NTU). He was the Director of the MSc (Financial Engineering) Programme at NTU from 2004 to 2010.

His research and teaching interests are in corporate finance, financial engineering, and investments. He received the NTU MSc (Financial Engineering) Programme Teacher of The Year Award in 2007. In 2008 and 2012, he received the NTU Best Teacher Award for the Banking and Finance Division and the EMBA Programme Best Teacher Award respectively. His publications have appeared in the Journal of Financial Economics, Journal of Financial and Quantitative Analysis, Journal of Futures Markets, Journal of Business Finance and Accounting, among others. In 2005, he received the NTU Researcher of The Year Award for Banking and Finance.

Prof Low has been actively involved in industry consultation and in-house executive training for major organizations in the public and private sectors. He was also appointed as a project consultant in the area of finance for the United Nations from 1994 to 1998.
